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The year seems to be rushing by! It is only 12 weeks until the start of National Congress, which hardly seems possible. There is a lot happening with New Zealand Bridge so I wanted to update everyone on key events of the past six weeks or so.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE

The National Conference was held on 10 June. This is the constitutionally required annual meeting of the National Board and representatives of the Regional Committees. It was a very pleasant meeting, conducted in the very best of spirit.

- A couple of remits were passed for consideration at the AGM. One sought to expand the right of Clubs to bring remits to the AGM, and the other to remove the right of the Board to block the National Conference from forwarding remits. All very technical stuff, but important in terms of upholding confidence in the governing structure of our game.
- The Board's proposed new Draft Strategic Plan was approved as was a Regional Bridge Development • Officer proposal. The former will soon go out to Clubs for consultation. If approved, and I hope it is, it should provide much-needed support to struggling Clubs. There's bound to be debate around how it is paid for, and I look forward to that too.
- Karen Martelletti's report on progress with the new website developments and Masterpoints automation was favorably received, and she expects it be in a position to go "live" later this month or early next. Great work Karen; you deserve a medal!

INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE

I attended my first meeting of the International Committee, held shortly after the teams' return from Seoul where they had performed with distinction. They both fell away a bit over the last couple of days, but a very creditable performance. No doubt we were all particularly pleased with the Open team's victories over the old foe Australia.

WORLD BRIDGE FEDERATION RULE CHANGES

BOARD MEETING

We had a Board meeting in Mt Maunganui on the 4th July. A couple of easy, "quick fix" changes to the constitution were adopted for forwarding to the AGM. They are pretty technical really (details in the Minutes); and major work on the constitution is progressing under Alan Turner's leadership.

With Allan Morris being appointed to the Board, we had to appoint a new Chairman of the Bridge Foundation, the charitable arm of New Zealand Bridge. I am pleased to say that that John Wignall, one



of the greats of bridge in NZ, has agreed to accept the position; and we shall consider one or two new appointments next month. And please, if anyone is thinking of making a bequest to support bridge development, particularly of Youth Bridge; do consider including the Foundation in your will.
