2♥ + 2♥ = ?

Queensland's Jimmy Wallis has seen it all. He bids and plays at the speed of light, so it is rare to find an auction that makes him pause for thought.

Jimmy's partner, Bill Nash, loves to bid 'em up, so Jimmy wasn't expecting a chance to play in diamonds at a comfortable level.

Bill opened 2♥, which seemed to put paid to Jimmy's chances of playing in diamonds. But South decided her hand wasn't strong enough to

overcall 2NT (looking at the hand below, who can blame her?) and decided a better description was an undercall of 1NT.

Jimmy is a gentleman through and through, so he let the lady have her bid. He could now bid a very much non-forcing 2♦.

But Bill didn't fly all the way from Australia to put down a nice 6-4 as dummy. So, after opening 2♥, he decided to rebid (in the literal sense of the word) 2♥.

Jimmy observed, "That's 4♥ you're playing, Bill. 2♥ + 2♥ = 4♥."

Regardless, he corrected to 3♦. Bill didn't try his luck with a third 2♥ bid and instead let Jimmy buy the contract.

3♦ failed by one trick. Jimmy quipped, "We've got a bid in the system for my hand. If I bid 3♦ over 1NT that's weak. But I knew Bill wouldn't be able to resist rebidding his suit, and I didn't want to have to rebid 4♦." Like I said, Jimmy's seen it all. Trust him to have system over his opponents' insufficient bids!

The observant will note that even what passes for reality when Douglas and Chris are at the table the usual norms of bidding have been academically discarded. In a conscious effort to deconstruct a bidding framework which disenfranchises the club suit our South has chosen to open a bidding dialogue with 1♣. In solidarity with this club preference North has also spurned the systemic hegemony of the majors for 2♣. Painting fuller pictures of their hands they bid naturally until we reach the point of decision for the East player who has until now been silent.

In the real world few actual bridge players would feel constrained to offer any contribution to the bidding and North South could continue on possibly to the politically very desirable No Trump contract.

However our hero the East player has been attentively following the auction in the Ackerley multiuniverse. For him his partner



has opened a strength-based club suit, distracting opposing bids have occurred during which his helpful

passes have revealed a 0-4 point hand. Knowing that some action is needed to alert Douglas to his maximum Chris bids 2NT.

At this point South steps across the divide from reality to join Chris and gracefully renouncing the chance of a juicy penalty he bids a mild 3♣. Befuddled all now pass, the contract makes. *“the Gods are having their laugh, whatever one does” Chris A.*

Barbara Campbell told me about a jocular exchange at a table with John Mitchell and Helen Barker from Nelson playing together against a



pair who had been less than agreeable. John had been active in the bidding over several boards popping up with bids all the time. His opponent turned to him and asked him about his habit of getting these bids in “Do they call you Rabbit at your club?” John replied with a question “What do they call you at your club?”

“Arsehole” was the reply. “At least we agree on one thing” said John.

I will also predict that a certain South will pause nervously before pulling the redouble card out of the box in the next few matches.

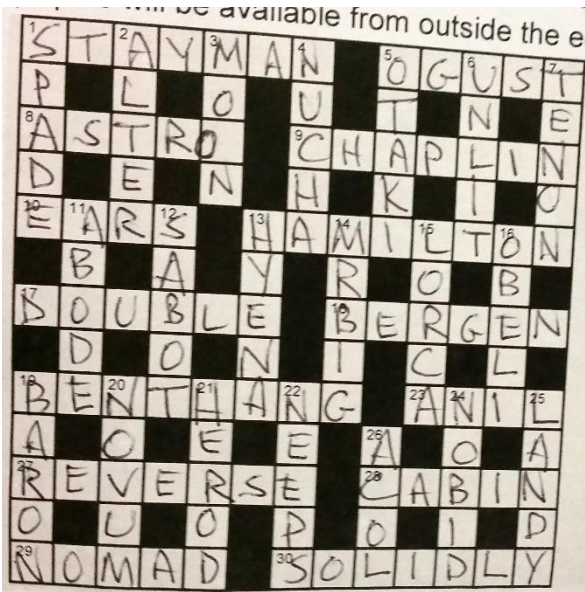

After a brief but lively auction, Peter was grateful to see Martin Bloom, North, put down a great dummy for his competitive raise. The Wests began with the ♣Q. Both declarers ducked this in dummy. Now James Coutts and Brad Coles paused for thought.

Looking at all four hands, it seems trivial to make nine tricks. Sharp defense holds declarer to his contract: a club to the ♣A, a spade to the ♠A, and a club ruffed with the ♥J to effect the promotion.

But the Wests weren't trying to hold the contract to nine tricks. They found the only card to give declarer a problem... the ♠Q!

After much consideration, the declarers ducked... whereupon the ♠A was cashed, the ♣A put East on lead, and the spade return promoted the ♥Q. The +50 that East/West scored may not have been enough to win any IMPs, but it was a successful and imaginative defense. Well done, James and Brad.

David Appleton was declarer in this tricky 4♠ contract.

North overtook the ♥J lead to play another.

After David ruffed he played ♠Q covered by ♠K and ♠A.

This first discard by North on the trump lead allowed the possibility of a tremendous brilliancy. The discard of the ♦K would have guaranteed an extra entry for south to play clubs through. In the event it wasn't found and in truth it would be hard to envisage the diamond situation with so little bidding.

David now played a diamond towards ♦AQ. North rose with ♦K and was allowed to hold the trick. The ♥K from North was ruffed high and south discarded. Now David could play a second round of trumps finessing the ♠7 if south played low.

Two features of the hand a possible entry creating unblock, and the strategy to set up the diamond side suit while declarer has trump control.

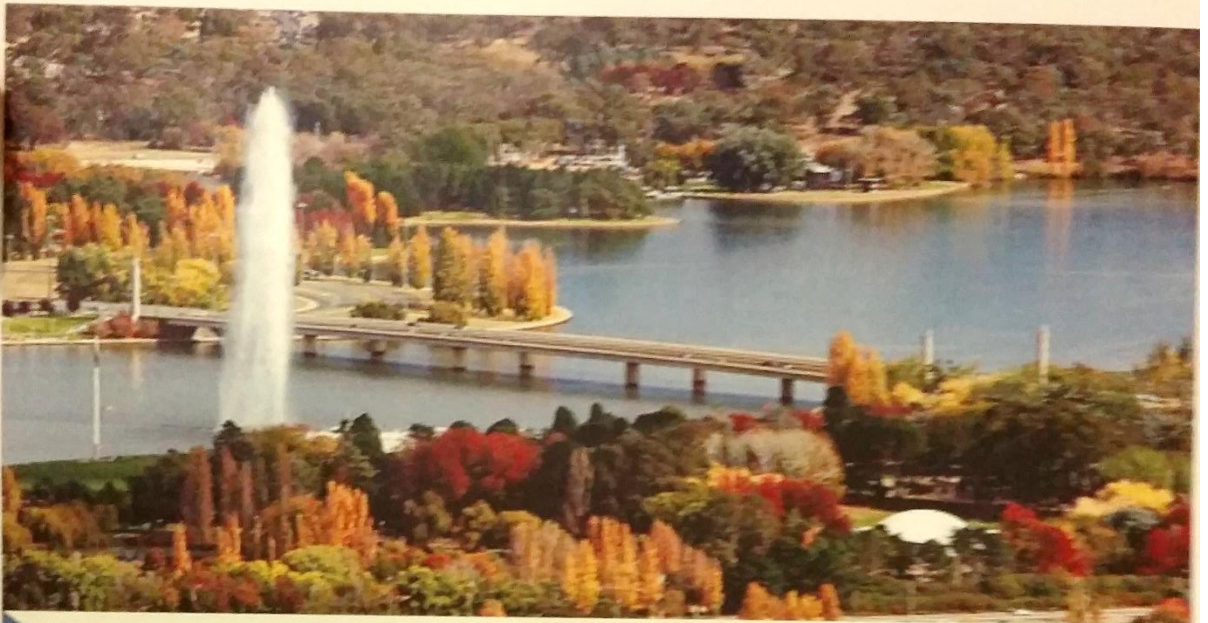

The normal lead is ♦9. At trick two East will likely switch to a trump – better than a ruff and discard or into a tenace. Rightly as David predicted Peter would rise with the ♠A, then try to lose a club to the safe hand (♣A and finesse if West follows). On this deal this drops the ♠K and finds the ♣Q. With all those things going right Peter would guess the heart as well.

A few declarers made only 9 tricks, they may have been victims of an attacking lead from West. Richard Solomon found the underlead in hearts. North figured to have values outside spades and maybe declarer could be fooled.

As so sometimes happens a hand that looks so promising for easy overtricks turned quickly sour for George Masters in match 6 playing with Noel against Aussie Youth reps Chris (West) and Nico (East).

Board 8 looked to be very comfortable in 2♥ from South. The ♦4 lead looked friendly until Nico won K♦, returned ♦2 to ruff and Chris came back ♣J. George decided to go up ♣A and pitch his second club on ♦A. Chris ruffed and played another club, south ruffing. George played ♥J which was ducked. Now George needs to be a bit careful or maybe lucky, if he plays to ♥Q it will lose to ♥A he will be cut off from a diamond trick and left with 2 spade losers. George played a low spade to ♠J and lucky for him Chris only had small spades so he was able to lose to the safe hand and scored a spade ruff in dummy.
