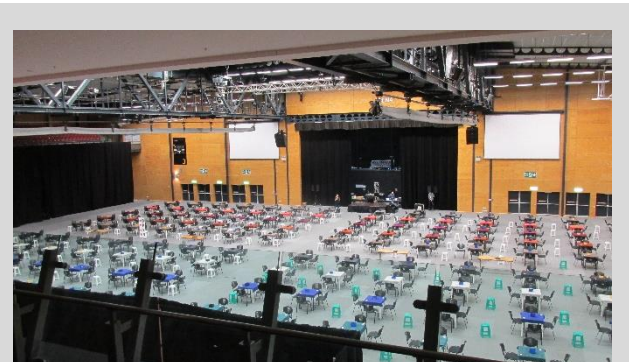

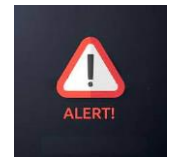
FROM THE CHIEF DIRECTOR:

FOR THE AUSTRALIANS (and other players) – THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW.

STOP CARDS:



NZ regulations require you to use a STOP CARD whenever you make a skip bid. The STOP CARD should be placed in front of the player next in turn to bid and remain there for 8-10 seconds. Failure to use the STOP CARD will be considered by the Director should there be a concern about Unauthorised Information due to a break in tempo. Repeated failure to use the STOP CARD may result in a Procedural Penalty.



ALERTING:

The Alerting Regulations in NZ are very similar to those in Australia but there are some differences.

2C response to 1NT opening If the 2C is simple Stayman then it should **not** be alerted. If there has been an intervening double, then is **must be** alerted. If the 2C response has any other meaning, then it must be alerted. Any non-natural 2C response to a 1NT overcall, must be alerted.

Pre-emptive raises to an opening bid. All pre-emptive raises must be alerted even if there has been an intervening bid.

Strong 2C opening and 2D response. A Strong 2C opener (rule of 29 compliant hand) does not need to be alerted and neither does the 2D negative response. All other uses of these calls must be alerted.

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SCORING CORRECTIONS:

Matchpoint Pairs Events

The scoring correction period finishes 30 minutes after the results are made available. The Scoring Correction Desk will be manned until the end of the scoring correction period for each session. Your opponents will need to confirm the requested scoring correction.

Swiss Pairs & Teams Events

The scoring correction period is: 15 minutes after the scheduled conclusion of the next match 30 minutes after the final results are made available. Advise a Director of any scoring corrections, confirmed by your opponents.

If you discover a scoring error within the scoring correction period and have left the venue then you may report it using the numbers above. This will be accepted subject to confirmation from your opponents. The correction will not be accepted if waiting for confirmation results in a delay in the next session or stage of an event.

PLAYER PROFILE (WITH QUIZ!):

In this series of profiles, we learn about the four players attending this year's Congress who have been "ever present".

Today, we meet Auckland's **Patrick Carter**. There is a chance to win a \$50 restaurant voucher at the end.

When and why did you take up bridge?

My stepfather was an accomplished chess player. Not in the league of Anthony Ker who has won multiple NZ Championship in chess, but he did play in national events. I went with him to the Hamilton Chess Club and I was interested enough to read most of the chess books in the Hamilton Public Library when I was about 11-13 years old. I am quite good tactically at chess but I don't have that intuitive sense for good positional play. The chess club met at the Hamilton Bridge Club so when I had finished the chess books, I read all the bridge books. There was no such thing as youth bridge in the 1970s and I didn't have a parent interested in cards so I didn't play any bridge at all until I was 18.

The other reason for taking up bridge is a card playing gene. My grandmother died when I was aged 1 and her mantelpiece was apparently filled with whist trophies. My mother hated cards. She said that was because she was forced to make up a four at whist when she didn't want to. She didn't tell me about my grandmother's whist trophies until I was in my twenties. The only link between that and my bridge is genetic, not family tradition.

What are some achievements / highlights you'd like to share?

Occasionally representing New Zealand in international events, but without much success.

Perhaps the best achievement is winning the Open Inter-Provincials with 5 different partners: Dwayne Crombie, Lachie Shea, Ken Yule, Julie Atkinson and Tom Jacob

Do you have a favourite Congress that you have attended?

2003 playing with Ken Yule. We won the Inter-Provincials that used to be on the Thursday / Friday, then came third in the NZ pairs and won the NZ Teams with Kathy Yule and Sam Simpson. I still remember stupidly bidding 3NT after the uninterrupted sequence of 1D-1H-3D with a moderate hand and a void in partner's



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diamonds. That cost Ken the chance of completing a clean sweep when he played like a Trojan for the whole 10 days.

Can you pinpoint your most memorable Congress moment?

Playing from the East seat in 3NT:

Lachie (dummy)	Patrick
♠Q542	♠AJ8
♥104	♥QJ93
♦A92	♦5
♣AQ97	♣KJ653

They led diamonds so I ducked twice and took the Ace on the third round, discarding first the 3H and then the 8S. Then I went to lead from dummy and partner stopped me to point out that the contract was 4S and I had just ruffed dummy's Ace. Sorry Lachie!

What makes a successful bridge partnership?

The ability to learn from misunderstandings without any need for recriminations. Not claiming that this is a strength of mine, but it is certainly something I have noticed in almost all the best partnerships

What other interests and achievements do you have outside of bridge?

I came 25th as an individual in a World Scrabble Championship and 7th representing NZ at scrabble as part of a team of five.

I was on the NZCBA management committee from about 1982 to 1999 and shared the organisation of the early NZ Congresses with Lionel Wright and a devoted team which included Arie Geursen, Richard Solomon, John Evitt and Alan Taylor

Do you have any words of wisdom for young players?

When you read an article about a bridge hand don't read it like a novel. Study it and understand it. Challenge it and see if the reasoning is flawed. The same thing applies now that we have the computer printout which says how many tricks are available double dummy in every denomination. Don't just look at it and announce to everyone that declarer can make 3NT. See what declarer has to do to make 9 tricks and look to see what the defence has to do to stop declarer making overtricks.

Battle of the Majors

This board was from session 3 of the NZ Pairs finals. Played 14 times, it produced a variety of results.



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We'll assume North opens 1C but Precision players will open it 2C. There could also be a case for 3C. East is going to pretty passive at this stage. West's aggressiveness (or passiveness) will play a large part.

The auction could certainly go several ways after both those openings, but fair to say, both sides established their major fit. The question is, how far are both sides prepared to go, especially in duplicate pairs and a big final? Trying to judge just how many matchpoints are going to be earned or lost depending on how far you go is going to be the key. For the record, 10 tricks are available with best defence / play in both major contracts.

One North-South pair played it in 3S – the only non-game contract. While they may have been a little disappointed to make 4 and record a part-score, that actually got them 18 out of 26 matchpoints! 5 pairs played it 4S, with only 2 of them successful with getting the play of the black suits right. A sacrifice in 5H **looks** to be the right thing to do, but unfortunately for 2 pairs that did this only 5 matchpoints were gained as they were doubled. A bit better for the 2 who played it undoubled and got 11 matchpoints. The big payoffs went to the 4 EW pairs who played it in 4H. All making, 2 of them doubled for good measure.

Interesting that, at the top level, so many different opinions as to when to stop and when to bid on. A testing board for the cream of the crop, goodness knows how the rest of us are supposed to get it right! No doubt many more hands will be dealt this year that will put even the pros to the test. How will you get on

2022 NZ BRIDGE AGM

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This was held on Friday 30 September at the new Mt Maunganui Clubrooms. Allan Morris presented his annual report. It is pleasing to see numbers rebounding and new members. He noted the online bridge working group would be the most consequential work that would be done in the next 10 years. There has been an increase in marketing efforts to capture new players. He also acknowledged the staff and volunteers who keep the game going in NZ. Sue Brown, in her finance portfolio, reported that NZ Bridge is in a healthy position with a surplus of approx. \$40,000 for the last year. Having the IPs online contributed to this as did the limited international program. Allan commented that the focus for the surplus will be development of the game.

In General Business it was reported that a proposal was going to be put to the Board to decrease affiliation fees and increase master point charges on a user-pays model in order to try and encourage non-affiliated clubs to affiliate. This led to a wider discussion regarding protecting Intellectual Property and making sure this is available to affiliated clubs / members only.

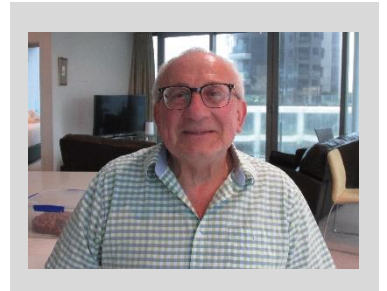

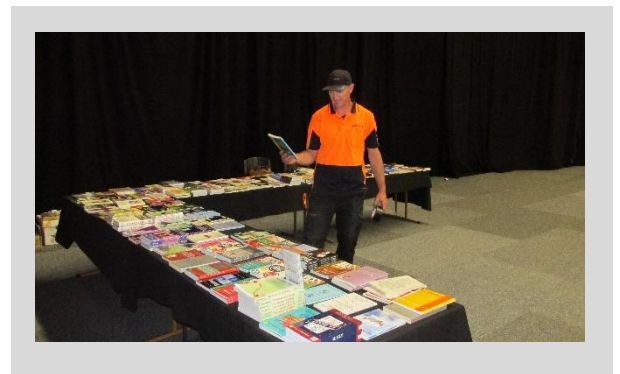
