I want to play more internationally and just keep competing at a high level.
Is there something that people might not know about you that you can share?
I'm a metaller - I like the really heavy sttuff.
Finally, any words of wisdom or advise to young (and other) players?
Don't stop counting!

## Huge "come from behind" victory in NZ Teams Round of 16.

In yesterday's Bulletin, I reported on the Jones team just qualifying for the top 16 in $16^{\text {th }}$ place thanks in large part to a 74 contract bid and made by Barry and Jenny in match 9 and then sneaking in despite a loss in match 10. For the round of 16 they were drawn to play team Skipper who took 4.65 carry-over IMPs into the match. The Skipper team won the first of three 12 board stanzas 28-18 and the second 38-5 to carry a 47 IMP lead into the final set. In an extraordinary reversal of
fortune the Jones team won the set by an astonishing 61 to 4 to win the match and progress to the quarter finals. They scored positive IMPs on 9 of the 12 boards with 1 scratch and 2 small losses. Significantly, three of the gains were 11,12 and 13 . Add that to a 7 and an 8 and that's the deficit gone and into the positives.
It proves that anything can happen to anybody at any time! This is especially the case in Teams (and Swiss Pairs) where misjudged contracts and / or mistaken plays can be punished in a brutal fashion.
Let's have a look at the 3 big boards. I wasn't present to watch the match nor have I had any details about bidding, but here's what happened in terms of results.

The Bo Haglund analysis says 10 tricks for EW and 9 for NS in their respective minors. Daniel Skipper and Leon Meier tried and failed in 5C for the Skipper team while David Skipper and Timothy Schumacher as NS were in 6DX resulting in a net score of 600 to the Jones team.

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Julie Atkinson and Patrick Carter chose 4H which, Bo Haglund says, makes from North but not South. However, they did play it from South. At the other table, David and Timothy chose 3NT which was doomed on a $\$$ lead. A net score of 520 and 11 IMPs for Jones.


On board 36 there are 11 tricks available in - but only part scores elsewhere, with NT not an option. Barry and Jenny chose the game which was successful whereas Daniel and Leon opted for 1 which was not. 800 and a big 13 IMPs for Jones.

So, a win from nowhere showing you should certainly never give up. I was going to make a comment about Grey Power triumphing but have decided not to.

## Shout out to Team Michl - 1 trick from glory!

The team of Andrew Michl, Peter Ramsay, Kinga Hajmasi and Candice Smith faced the daunting task of taking on the unbeaten Geromboux team (Christy Geromboux, Sebastian Yuen, Julian Foster and Jenna Gibbons) in the NZ Teams Round of 16. Team Geromboux took 9 IMPs into the match as their carry-over and the final result was 65-57 victory. A quick maths calculation reveals that team Michl actually won the match by 1 IMP. The stanza scores were 22-10 and 13-10 to Geromboux followed by 37-21 to Michl. Board 36 (mentioned just previously) proved fruitful for them as well as Kinga and Candice were successful in 5 while Christy and Sebastian faring poorly in 3NT. There was a nice pick-up on Board 32 for them also.


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Andrew and Peter sitting NS were happy with 3NT while, at the other table Jenna and Julian unsuccessfully tried 6 $\mathbf{6}$.

Board 30 (described earlier) was the saviour for Team Geromboux as Jenna and Julian made the 4 contract which Andrew and Peter missed by one trick for a 10 IMP swing. One trick - that was the difference between the leaders going through and being sent packing in a massive upset. A superb effort from Team Michl. They should be extremely pleased and proud of their efforts.

Max Robb of Christchurch was quite pleased about his team's showing in the NZ Open teams. Along with Bill Mecchia, Dorothy Bain and Jim Burford, they accumulated just over 100 VPs in the 10 rounds to finish $29^{\text {th }}$ which they considered to be "punching above their weight".

## NZ OPEN TEAMS QUARTER AND SEMI FINALS

Having survived a big scare in the Round of 16, team Geromboux faced the team of Bob Hurley, Kathy Yule, Kate Davies, John Patterson, GeO Tislevoll and Kenneth Yule in the quarter final.
The carry-over of 9 IMPs wasn't needed this time as a very one-sided stanza one saw them win 59-0, scoring consistently with 4 boards of 10 or more IMPs. Despite a 31-21 win in stanza 2 for the Hurley team, it was decided not to play a $3^{\text {rd }}$ stanza and an early lunch was taken.
The other match-ups saw Boughey v Hung, Bach v Jones and Fisher v Jarvis. While all three of them went the distance in terms of playing 3 stanzas, the results were fairly

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comfortable with sizeable wins to teams Hung (Andy Hung, Shane Harrison, James Coutts, Glenn Coutts), Bach (Ashley Bach, Paul Dalley, Malcolm Mayer, Michael Ware, Martin Reid ,Peter Newell), and Fisher (Blair Fisher, Liz Fisher, Wayne Burrows, Clair Miao, Sam Simpson, Jo Simpson)

The Semi Finals got underway this afternoon with Geromboux playing Hung and Fisher playing Bach.

The semi-finals are run over two sessions with $2 \times 12$ board stanzas in each session. The semi-finals are played behind screens. This, says Chief Director Murray Wiggins, is top reduce the possibility of Unauthorised Information.
All bidding is done using bidding boxes and with the screens down. As you can see from the photos there are two players on each side of the screen. There are special regulations for matches played behind screens as set out in the NZ Bridge Manual. The key difference is in alerting. You cannot see your partner's bid until the tray has been slid under to you when it is your time to call. Therefore, if you are going to make an alertable bid, you put the alert card out, making sure the other person on your side of the screen sees it, and then make your bid. Explanations are made usually by pointing to it on the system card or writing a note. When the tray comes through, you will see your partner has made an alertable bid and explain it in the same fashion if necessary.
Once the auction is finished the screen is rolled up to a certain point so everyone can see the cards, but not each other. Again, this reduces the chances of Unauthorised Information. Murray explains that all WBF teams events are played behind screens. For this event it is for the semi-finals and final only, if for no other reason than the amount of space it takes up. However, the equipment is there to have screens from the Quarter-final stage should the decision be made to implement that.
After 2 stanzas, the Geromboux team leads by 30 and Fisher leads their match by just 8.5 . So, all to play for tomorrow.

Well, that's what we are taught is good etiquette / manners to say when dummy goes down. But even if this is what they put down?


Well, what did you expect? Especially when you held this hand:

Need a calculator? (or an abacus?) 27! Yes, 27 high card points. When was the last time you had that many? Sitting $4^{\text {th }}$ in hand you're probably expecting 3 passes and then to open 24. With a wee bit of luck, you won't get 2 , from partner, but even so, all they need is about a 5 count to go hot-footing it into a slam.

Here's the full deal:

Notice something about the South hand? I can't speak for everyone of course but, me personally, the threat of Putin and Kim coming after me couldn't stop me opening here. I usually play a multi 2 but that doesn't take up enough space so straight in with 3 (or 30 if I am playing with one of my partners that I play transfer pre-empts with).

So, now what as West? And even if you do get to open 2C, chances are South will still put their oar in after your partner's $2 \downarrow$ response. 27 High Card points ... A hand bridge players can usually only dream about, ruthlessly destroyed by your inconsiderate partner who can only muster up a single, useless point. Oh well 3NT then. Thank you partner! Proof of my theory that partners are there for the purpose of disappointing you.

This hand appeared in Round 6 of the Open and Restricted Open Swiss Pairs today. In the Open section 35 pairs did indeed bid and make 3 NT with 8 getting an overtrick somehow (three went 1 light). A few played in 5 of a minor which goes 2 away and God Bless the 4 pairs who had a go at 6 . It's got about as much chance as Trump admitting he lost, but I can't say I blame anyone for refusing to accept that this hand is not good enough for a slam.
I am intrigued by the pair that played it in 1 . If they want to come and tell me their logic behind opening this l'd be interested to hear it. Much the same picture in the smaller Restricted Swiss Pairs field with 3NT making being in the clear majority. Again, one pair had a go at the - slam.
