# **Signals and Discards**

Defence is one of the most difficult aspects of bridge for a partnership to grasp. What can we do to make it easier?

# 1. Opening Leads and Leads during the Play

The **Opening Lead** must be clear and unambiguous.

Lead top of a sequence <u>KQJx, QJ9x, 1098x</u>

Low card promises an honour
Q97<u>2</u>, Q9<u>8</u>, KJ4<u>3</u>

High card (non-honour) denies an honour
972, 8763, 97654

# **Leading During the Play of the Hand**

- Do exactly the same as above no change at all
- o If partner leads a suit showing an honour(s), always return that suit unless you have a **very good** reason not to do so.

# 2. Signals during the Play of the Hand

When a lead is made, it would be helpful if partner indicates whether they like the lead or not.

Use the same concepts as above :

- Play a low card to show an honour (or shortage if defending a suit contract)
- Play a high card to show no help in that suit

#### 3. Discards

During the play, how do you show partner where you have an honour? You will get an opportunity to do this when you **discard**.

To show partner where you have an honour or not, either:

- o Discard a high card shows **no** honour in that suit
- o Discard a low card shows at least one honour in that suit (A, K or Q)

For example, partner has led a spade against a 4 v contract and when declarer draws trumps, you must discard. If you discard a high diamond then you have **no** honour in diamonds, but may have a club honour (you will have already indicated your spade holding on partner's lead).

Against a notrump contract, try not to discard from a long, good suit. A high card in another suit says you are not interested.

# 4. Summary

- Lead an honour shows a sequence of at least two touching cards
- Lead/discard a low card shows at least one honour in that suit
- Lead/discard a high card shows no honour in that suit
