POLICY FOR CORRECTION OF SCORING ERRORS

- 1. The directors will change a scoring error which is reported by the player who has benefitted from the error.
- 2. Errors reported by the nonbenefitting side must be confirmed to the director

by the opponents unless, in the opinion of the director, the error is demonstrably obvious.

3. The Chief Director's decision is final.

Review of Director's Ruling

If a director gives a ruling at the table with which you are uncomfortable, please advise the director that you would like a review of that decision by the Chief Director. The director will then advise you and your opponents where to meet with the Chief Director (usually Seminar Room 3)

Back to the Future Teams

This event runs on Monday for those who do not qualify for the Pairs Final or the Plate. The format of the event is that over the 3 sessions (2 qualifying and the final) each member of a team has to play one session with each other member. This means that it is inappropriate for substitutes to be allowed except in a genuine emergency. Therefore, teams containing players who are also contesting the Rubber final CANNOT qualify to play in the final of the Back to the Future. As with all Congress events, substitutes can only be approved by the Chief Director.

Now doping comes to the sedate world of bridge

SPORTS doping is usually associated with muscled athletes attempting to cheat their way into the record books. However, the latest World Anti-Doping Agency figures show that bridge, billiards and angling can be just as afflicted by suspect drug tests.

pect drug tests.
In 2014, 3.6 per cent of samples-from bridge players at worldwide tournaments showed the presence of prohibited substances. For billiards, the figure was L1 per cent, while for "casting" disciplines such as angling and 6y fishing, 10.6 per cent of samples resulted in an adverse analytical finding.

Sports such as athletics and cycling both scored just I per cent. An "adverse analytical finding" indicates the presence of a prohibited substance, although there could be a legitimate reason for that result,

such as permitted medical use.

Anna Gudge, of the World Bridge
Federation, said: "When I say I deal
with the anti-doping staff they all
laugh." Dr Jaap Stomphorst, an
expert on doping, said: "Bridge is
played in tournaments two or three
weeks long. People tend to get
tired so a stimulant can keep you
awake during play."

Beta-blockers are no longer hanned in bridge, despite their potential to improve concentration, because many players take them for hypertension and other conditions. Ben Thompson, from the Angling

For Frompson, from the Angling Trust, said that some casting events - where lead weights are attached to rods - need the same sort of power as the hammer event in athletics.








Careful play from Tegan Bennik

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


Taking tricks with Enid Trower




At 97 we think Enid is the most senior senior at Congress. Her home club is Hamilton and in the last year apart from Congress she has played often in Rotorua and Morrinsville. She earned her first A points in 1995, but since 2003 she has been regularly gaining up to 13 A points per year, the more recent years more fruitful than earlier ones.

I watched Enid at the wheel for a couple of hands in the Restricted Open.



The bidding was simple: INT – 3NT. The play almost as quick. Enid as West took the ♣ lead with J♣, followed by 2 more clubs, and 8 tricks in the red suits.



Watching two Gold Grandmasters in round one, I am bound to pick up some good tips. Let's start with Hand 1, effectively this is the first hand of the Congress. Surely the dealmaster will start with an easy one.




Julie had to play 1NT from the North hand, Martin Bloom lead a fourth highest . After ducking a round Julie took her Ace and played one back. So E-W took 4 spade tricks, Julie pitching a heart.

Martin found a good switch low ♥ from Q7, to the 10 ducked. Now a 3♣ to Ace and 2♣ from Julie. Martin thought for a moment and took his King, Peter following

with 9♣. Now Q♥ left Julie on play again. She couldn't be denied a diamond trick but -3 still left Martin Bloom and Peter Gill smiling.

Patrick and Julie play Kiwiclub. Perhaps the auction on 25 might have helped Murray McMillan bring home a difficult game.

The defence was to lead A♣ and force with clubs. Declarer ruffed tried a ♠ to East's Ace. Now declarer went seriously wrong discarding a small ♦ on the third ♣, West cashed A♦ and continued the club force ruffed by North and overruffed with Keiran's Q. When the dust settled it was 800 to EW. Brutal.

Simon Brayshaw Matthew Raisin played in the best scoring 6NT from south on board 15. To make a make a great result fantastic Simon got a low ♠ lead. After running 3 club tricks and 6 diamonds, EW had both pitched hearts. That with a heart finesse delivered 13 tricks.

Patrick and Julie relayed to 6♦ played by North after a ♠ lead and ♦ switch suggested the K♥ was well-placed but Julie had no trouble setting up a long club to pitch the hearts from dummy.

Julie and Patrick started by playing board 7 against Alan Dormer and Anthony Hopkins. Alan invented the Dormer coup in the bidding. During a long relay sequence he paused thoughtfully then produced a pass in Julie's section of the bidding pad. Sorry not today the bidding continued and Patrick found the matchpoint winning 6NT to start off a grandmasterly set 62.97%.

Book Review



Defending Suit Contracts (Test Your Bridge Technique)

David Bird and Tim Bourke

2005

Master Point Press

What could be easier than defending perfectly? Unfortunately just about everything.















This book has 36 problems in batches of 4. Each problem comes with a clear explanation of the solution and principle involved eg trump promotion, removing entries to dummy, and more complex situations requiring cooperation with partner.

Problem books of this type can sometimes seem too simple because the reader is naturally on the alert for a problem. Also there can be a tendency to focus on clean examples where there is only one thing to consider. Equally the partnership element of defence is harder to convey than neater problems which just require to follow suit or show count.

The authors overcome these traps by supplying extensive notes explaining each solution. Sometimes they give a more difficult in the solution to develop the point.

Clearly this book uses a tried and true formula, showing real examples and avoiding jargon.

Andy deduced correctly that 7* was cold (there were 14 top tricks) though had not considered how the opposition could retreat there without his consent.




