Bridge clubs and websites

Clubs need a website these days because your club will nowadays be found primarily by people "googling" your club name. The old way of looking in the classified ads of the paper, or reaching for a directory are long gone!

At ClubHub, we can help by supplying web software that the search engines will rank highly. It is not just "key words" these days; your web site ranking improves with your website system features. These might include secure communication, and the ability to be viewed easily on any size of web browser, from phone to TV.

Once your club's website can be found, you need a flow of content. I suggest appointing a club communications officer, and give them the news@club email address. Then remind members of that address on a regular basis!

Websites need ideas for stories, so get your members involved, by asking them for:

- *stories about successes (including their own!) in home or away competitions,*
- *pictures of members having fun,*
- *articles on bridge, or helpful tips, or tutorial pages;*
- *information on upcoming events like competitions, quiz nights, the club AGM and the Xmas party.*

And of course, have your club session results posted quickly after sessions, or use one of the systems where you can link to results collated electronically.

With a flow of photos, news, results and other information, now your website will start to become a place people become interested in looking at. That flow can also be broadcast on social media. So get a club Facebook page and open a twitter account, and post something

twice a week and always with a link back to the relevant club web page so the reader can read more if they want.

Another way to enhance your site is to give some thought to saving volunteer time by putting administration online where members can serve themselves.

For instance:

- *allow your members to register and pay their annual club subs, and for club sessions,*
- *sell items online - from competition entries to T-shirts to bridge cruises,*
- *allow bookings for events and competitions, and payment of entry fees.*

For larger clubs, ClubHub offers software to provide an online member account, and integrates with Xero to save your club treasurer heaps of time.

Websites are a combination of participation by members; and having the right technology to streamline processes and maximise efficiency.

Once West has opened 1♠ it looks impossible to stop short of slam. 3 pairs bid and made 6♠ and 4 made 6♦. But 33 declared and failed in 6♠. I talked to Martin Reid of wellington who considered his play in 6♠ very carefully. His thoughts:

- That South is much more likely to be long in ♠ after the pre-empt. This is sometimes called vacant spaces. North will have 7 cards in ♥ and only 6 cards outside. South with 3 cards in ♥ is almost twice as likely to have 3 card or longer spade holding (6/10).
- Martin can still win if North has a singleton Q or J of ♠ by playing A♠ from dummy.
- Ruffing a second ♥ in dummy may not help and could cause communication problems.
- Having ruffed a ♥ in dummy Martin can cash A♠ and if no honour drops, continue with K♠. Then if 3 rounds of clubs can be cashed before the defender with the best ♠ can ruff, Martin pitches one ♥ loser on 3rd club and the other on 4th. Later he will pitch the ♦ loser on the 5th ♣.

Unlucky this time. North ruffs in to cash ♥ tricks.

Do you like the "pick a slam 5NT bid?" For many pairs it would be grand slam try for ♠.

HUMs are you prepared?.

We were competing in the NZ Teams and found ourselves in round 5, the last round of the night, playing against a HUM system. At that time we were lying 63rd in the field. There was no break between rounds so we had less than 10 minutes to find our opponents, discover their system and begin play.

For those who are unaware of HUM systems this one provides for all one level suit bids not vulnerable to be partially artificial showing in some cases a 3+ card major with Pass showing various possible ranges of points, and 1♠ most hands <8 points (the Fert bid). Needless to say our partners feel they were totally unprepared. As a result they were left upset by the whole experience.

We want to ask if this is the best way to organise qualifying rounds of the NZ Teams? In our view the very first instruction was not enforced and we were not made aware of it. Secondly while we cannot suggest a solution we are not happy that future teams will face a similar situation next year. The rule forbidding HUMs for 2 rounds seems at best arbitrary. It may well be a better option for HUMs to arrive at the Round of 16. Even with an interest in developing our own defence, we had no time to do so. The first we knew about it was after we sat down to begin play.

Systems in the Teams

At no time may a HUM system be used in the lower half of the field. A number of teams will be designated as "having no system protection". If 2 of these teams meet at any time then HUMs are permissible. Otherwise, HUMs may not be played in the first 2 rounds of the qualifying. A list of unprotected teams will be posted as soon as possible after entries close. If you are opposed by a HUM pair, then you are allowed a written defence (one A4 side) on the table during the match.

Lorraine McArthur Anne Shearer bid very well indeed with this good ♦ fit and natural Acol. I particularly like Lorraine’s decision to jump support with a nice 5 card suit. At pairs you might regret going beyond 3NT. Here it made it easy for Anne to check for Aces and bid to the best contract.

She also played it well, cashing two top ♦, left the Q out and crossruffed majors to set up the long heart for a club discard.

Anne commented “The experts will bid and make 7”, I had to correct her. Only *Deepfinesse* gets every Q hunt correct. Every expert I know would be very happy both with the contract, the play, and result.
