East has a perfect takeout double over $1 \star$. West bids $1 \wedge$ as the hand is not strong enough to bid 1 NT.

East, who has a good hand, competes to 3 over 2 \&. West passes. The K is worth nothing as North is sitting over the king with a good diamond suit.

Lead: $\vee \mathrm{A}$

East has an easy penalty double holding two aces and a good trump holding.

East should lead out the two aces and then sit back and wait for their trump tricks.
