It's a little worrying. Partner has previously tried to claim a Homer for playing 3NT when he was actually in 4. Here he is playing 7 doesn't even attempt to draw trumps. Julie Atkinson became increasingly concerned as the tricks ticked by and still the trumps remained untouched. Trick5, trick 6, trick 7, trick 8, trick 9 but then...


Julie and Patrick Carter had relayed their way to $7 \triangleleft$ from South and West led the $\uparrow 2$. Patrick took that with the 8 and Julie looked with a mounting sense of disaster as the next 8 tricks developed:

2e was intended as Stayman but it doesn't look like it was read as such by Tracey. xx was intended as for rescue but it doesn't look like it was read as such by Tracey.

The $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$ was led to Tracey's Ace and she cashed the $₫ \mathrm{~K}$ and $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$ before successfully finessing the $\$ 10$. She gave up a heart and west returned a club to east's King and Tracey's Ace. Again she gave up a heart and ruffed West's spade return. A mini-cross ruff for a couple of tricks and Tracey emerged with 9 tricks and plus 1160.

## The Delmonte Award

This was presented to Congress By the late Curly Delmonte and is presented to the player judged to have acted in a most sporting and ethical manner. If you are the recipient of an act of this type please either write it up yourself and give it to the Bulletin or else call at Seminar 1 and tell either

Stan or Alan about it. We had a nomination from Sam Simpson the other day and today we have another from Peter Hensman who writes:

I would like to nominate Anne Shearer for the Delmonte Award. We were in 3NT and declarer conceded that the opponents' suit would run resulting in only 8 tricks for declarer. However, Anne pointed out that their suit was blocked and the contract, in fact, made 10 tricks.

## The Round of 16

This saw the Carter team play the Spooner team. For Carter, Barry Jones (S) and Jenny Millington faced Nico Ranson (W) and John McMahon while Patrick Carter (E) and Julie Atkinson opposed Matt Smith ( N ) and Andrew Spooner.

The imps started moving on board 1

North opened $1 \vee$ and this was passed round to Julie who made a take out double, light in high cards but good in distribution. North bid $2 \vee$ and now it was up to Patrick. They stopped in 3a. Only 5 pairs bid game and 2 went light. Making 4 didn't look like a great result,
but it was the other room that caused the problem.

Jenny opened $1 \vee$ as dealer and that was passed round to Nico who doubled. Jenny raised herself and John doubled - this time for blood. The \&A was cashed by John and he switched to the $\diamond$ which ran to Jenny's Ace. She cashed the trump Ace getting the bad, if unsurprising, news when Nico discarded a club. Jenny continued with a small heart to John's 9 and dummy's Jack. She then ran the $\vee 8$ to John's King. John played a diamond to Nico's Queen but Jenny ruffed the $\downarrow$ K with the 10 for her fourth trick. She cashed the $\vee Q$, while this was going on Nico had pitched 2 clubs and John one so Jenny was able to establish the $\$ 8$ as her eighth trick for +470 and 12 imps for Carter

Spooner got 6 back on the next and the third board was flat before the double figures reappeared on 4.


Nico and John were quickly in 3NT. Jenny led the 2 and Nico (no doubt praying hard) called for the King. His prayers were answered and he quickly
added 5 diamond tricks and 3 hearts to make his game.

After a very complex auction, which happily we lost, Julie and Patrick stopped in $4 \star$, missing $5 \star$, and the rather easier 3NT and Spooner collected 10 imps

Several lesser scoring hands followed but, by the time they reached board 8, Spooner led by 11.


Julie, West, opened 2\&, which showed the majors, (we think). Patrick bid 2 4 , and Andrew sitting South with 17 points felt obliged to double. Julie bid $2 \vee$, and this was passed out. The opponents led trumps every single time they were in. This drifted 2 off .

Actually nobody made any contract at any table.

At Barry and Nico's table the auction was:

$1 *$ is an advance guard on a variety of hands. Jenny's pass of the double forced the redouble to start a run out.

Barry was only able to score his spade tops together with 3 trumps in hand and a heart ruff in dummy. 6 tricks and -300 and a combined -400 for Carter saw them concede 9 imps.

Two flat boards followed before the blood-letting resumed.


Despite a brief Michaels interjection, Jenny and Barry were quickly in $4 \vee$ from North.

The $\downarrow$ was led and ran to Jenny's ruff. Jenny gave her line considerable thought before emerging with a fatal small club. John's singleton King scored and he again tapped declarer by playing a diamond. Jenny tried the club Ace but it was too late and John ruffed. Yet another diamond came out and Jenny was in serious danger of losing trump control. She ruffed and cashed the $\uparrow A$ but, when she played a club, John ruffed with the King and the contract was down.

Patrick and Julie defended the same contract, played by Matt from the North seat. The J of diamonds was led by

Patrick, ducked in dummy, and ruffed. Next came A clubs, dropping the K, and a club to the J and Julie's Q. A heart switch might beat the contract here, but Julie not unreasonably played her singleton spade.

Matt took this with his Ace, and 12 minutes later played another club, ruffed while Patrick discarded. J was played to the K, not ruffed by Julie, a club ruffed, and now another spade which Julie must ruff, otherwise Patrick is end played. If she ruffs AND plays a heart, there is a heart to lose, and the last spade.

This the position:


At this point, declarer has only lost one trick. Julie's ruff of the spade is number
2. Removing the heart from South means that Patrick must come to a heart (number 3) and a spade.

She didn't ruff the losing spade, would you?

4v made.
8 pairs went light, only 2 bid and made $4 \vee$.

Onto the last:


After 2 passes, John opened their ubiquitous 1\& and Barry doubled. Nico jumped to 2\& and you can choose your own epithetic description for that. Jenny called $3 \vee$ and Barry bid the 9 trick game.

A diamond was led to the Queen as Barry ducked. He let the spade switch go to West's Jack and ducked when John’s $\uparrow$ K appeared on the next. He took the A at trick 5, unblocking dummy's Queen. He then cashed two more clubs before playing a diamond to dummy's Ace and then cashed the $\uparrow 10$. He played a spade to the Ace and in a last desperate attempt to make his contract, he tried a heart towards dummy's QJx. The defence claimed 3 tricks and Barry's $\Delta \mathrm{K}$ withered on the vine. 2 off.

After 2 passes East opened $2 \boldsymbol{\imath}$, the usual Precision type stuff. A vul 2\& overcall from Andrew got 2NT from Matt. And Andrew bid game.

The club lead was taken by the Ace, and the 9 diamonds was led to the Q.
A heart away from the AK, how was
Patrick to know there was a hidden 5
card heart suit? This was taken by the Jack, a spade to the Ace followed. Another losing diamond finesse was taken, but there were now 9 tricks that. $\backsim J$ being the vital ninth With the other room having gone 2 light that was 13 imps to Spooner and a handy 43 imp lead after one third of the match.

## Round Of 16 - Last Set

This saw the Stout team, lagging by 8 imps, take on the Lei team. Gary Chen (E) and Jin Yan opposed Warren Lazer $(\mathrm{S})$ and Pauline Gumby in one room while Graeme Stout (W) and Jeff Miller faced June Lei ( N ) and Shaolin Sun.

Board 25 saw the first action:

June, North, opened 1\&, and Jeff overcalled $1 \uparrow$. This was passed round to North who doubled. For some reason Jeff felt that this was going to be passed for penalties, (correct!) and decided for a premature escape to 1 . . This was doubled (for penalties ?) and this was the final contract. The defence was relentless, the singleton club was led to the Ace, a spade was returned to the Jack, a spade back to the Ace, 2 diamonds and a diamond ruff, a club
ruff and a diamond ruff, and still a heart to lose.

3 light -800
Warren and Pauline were prepared to sell out in a part score but Jin came to their rescue.

Pauline played largely on cross-ruff lines and emerged with 10 tricks but that was 9 imps to Lei. Without Jin's intervention it would have been 12 and this is not insignificant as will be seen.

Lei now had a 17 imp lead with just 11 boards to play. 1 imp to Stout on 26 and then


June played in 3NT on a bidding sequence that your editors assistant was unable to diagnose. (That means he couldn't see the bidding sheet).

The lead was 5 of spades to the singleton Ace, and June unblocked with the Queen, although there was no actual finessing position later. This
probably should cost the contract, as the double club finesse gives 2 tricks, the $Q$ coming down in 2 makes another 3 tricks, the heart finesse is 3 tricks, so we only need 2 spade tricks. However, the defence lost their way, and 3NT came home. +400

In the other room, 3NT was never in the picture. Warren opened the South hand $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ - never mind the quality, feel the width. What do you mean "what width?" Pauline raised immediately to game. Twist and turn as he could, Warren could not overcome the "quality" of his trumps and drifted one off for Lei to collect another 10 imps to lead by 26.

By the time board 35 landed, Stout had halved this deficit.


There is some (little) interest in the fact that although N-S have a good 5-4 spade fit, the master suit was never mentioned in either room.

Shaolin opened $1 \vee$ and Graeme made a take out double. North bid 4v (probably hoping he could double 4 spades from EW, Hah.) His hopes were dashed when East bid $5 \star$, which will make unless South underleads his 7 card heart suit and gets a club ruff.
(Oh we editors are good when we can see all 4 hands!)

West bid $6 \star$, doubled by North, but South pulled it to $6 \vee$, wouldn't we all as we might not have one defensive trick. This went 1 off. -100

In the other room, the red card got a real workout.

Shaolin drew trumps for Warren at trick one when he led the $\vee 4$. Warren took this on table and played the $\$ 10$ to the queen and Ace. Shaolin cashed the $\star A$ but, when he attempted to repeat the act in clubs, he got a rude shock when Warren ruffed. Warren the successfully finessed in spades (based on West having made a take-out double.
Obviously, Warren doesn't play at the Auckland Club where they make takeout doubles with 4 of your suit) to make his contract, claim 13 imps , produce a drawn match and set up a 4 board play-off.

I think that under the circumstances of the match, and faute de mieux today, I'm going to give Warren the

The rather obvious spade lead was taken immediately and Andi tried to sneak a diamond through. Liam rose with the Ace, and 5 spades and 2 club tricks later, was -400.
