











2023 NZ BRIDGE CONGRESS



Julian picks up the story here: "I had a horrible lead from the North seat, and chose ♣10, which

ran to Shane's queen. He played a heart up. I rose A and exited a heart, which he ruffed in hand.

He played a spade to the jack, and ruffed another heart with ♠Q. He then cashed ♠K, discovering the bad break.

Next came a club to the jack then ♥K and ♣A. In the four-card ending, dummy had ♠A8 and ♦72.

He led a diamond to the jack, king and my ace. I had only diamonds left so had to exit a diamond to Jenna's queen, and she was endplayed to lead a spade from ♠106 into dummy's ♠A8. Beautifully played for 10 tricks and a well-deserved 10 IMP pickup".

New faces

Bridget Hannaway: Congress Event Manager

Bridget started playing bridge in the nineties. Brought up in a card-playing family, she was looking for a hobby that was social and fun and gave her time out as a young mum. She took lessons at Wellington Bridge Club learning Acol.

After 10 years of playing weekly, she was cajoled into playing her first junior tournament, by her partner, who was also tournament secretary.

"I played in the tournament and we won - it was a real thrill. I thought this tournament lark is pretty good, and it progressed from there. Otherwise, I'd probably still be coming along once a week then going home.

Bridget is Wellington Bridge Club Manager, a job she's been doing for 12 years. Outside of bridge, she's a passionate gardener. Bridget describes bridge "as a game for people of all ages and stages of their life. You can play it socially or competitively. But it's the friendships that you make that are a huge part of what keeps me coming back."

Teri Logie: Congress Manager

Teri started playing bridge in Zimbabwe in the 1980s.

"It wasn't very serious. It was very social, dinner, drinks or brunch and then we'd play bridge."

Baking or cake decorat-

ing came to mind when Teri was looking for a new



hobby in 2014.

Prophetic words from her mother in-law: "You hate cooking, why not try bridge?" resulted in Teri taking lessons at Tauranga Bridge Club. Working from home can be quite lonely and the social connections and friendships keep Teri playing bridge.

"I love to win, don't get me wrong, but I go there for the people." Mount Maunganui is Teri's home club, where she is also Club Captain. Teri credits Karen Martelletti with getting her involved in congress, firstly as a standby player and then as floor manager. Teri works full time for a restaurant chain doing payroll and accounts.

A completer finisher with an eye for detail, this year she took on the position of Congress Manager. It's a varied role ranging from health and safety, managing the playing room, filling the first aid box, and whatever is needed to keep the congress running well. When she's not playing, you'll most likely find Teri walking on the beach.

Carolyn Black : Congress Reception

"I like being organised, being around people and getting things sorted". This combination of skills and attributes make Carolyn



perfect for assisting at the front desk. So, when she was offered the job, she jumped at the chance.

The role is not new for Carolyn. She's previously helped out as a caddy and filled in as a sub, but this year she's delighted to be part of the Congress Team.

Carolyn took lessons at the Waikato club in 1998 but "diving off the deep end" aptly describes her introduction to playing bridge. "I never really got to play junior or intermediate bridge. I went straight into open bridge, because babysitter issues meant







I couldn't play on the club's beginner or intermediate nights. It was a bit of a baptism of fire."

Carolyn likes the competitive side of bridge, playing either at the club or in tournaments. "I've tried playing socially but it's not the same. It doesn't have the same edge. I need there to be consequences!"

STOP CARDS:

NZ regulations require you to use a STOP CARD

whenever you

make a skip bid. The STOP CARD should be placed in front of the player next in turn to bid and remain there for 8-10 seconds. Failure to use the


STOP CARD will be considered by the Director should there be a concern about Unauthorised Information due to a break in tempo. Repeated failure

Also for the Australians:



to use the STOP CARD may result in a Procedural Penalty.

ALERTING:

The Alerting Regulations in NZ are very similar to those in Australia but there are some differences.

Stayman

Simple Stayman **must not** be alerted unless there has been an intervening double in which case it **must be** alerted.

If the 2♣ response to 1NT opening bid has any other meaning, then it **must be** alerted. Any non-natural 2♣ response to a 1NT **overcall**, **must be** alerted.

Stayman over 2NT.

Preemptive raises

All preemptive raises to an **opening bid must be** alerted even if there has been an intervening bid.

Preemptive raises to an **intervening bid must not** be alerted.

Strong 2♣ opening and 2♦ response.

A Strong 2♣ opener (rule of 29 compliant hand) and the 2♦ negative response **must not** be alerted. All other uses of these calls **must be** alerted.
